JCEM Case Reports / Revision Checklist for Case Reports

Below is a list of items based on the errors most frequently seen in manuscripts submitted to JCEM Case Reports.

To improve the clarity of your case report, and to speed the production process if your manuscript is accepted, it is important that you review the items below and confirm that they're presented correctly in the revised manuscript that you submit.

Below are two sections: General Items, which address errors seen throughout the entire manuscript, and Specific Sections, which details those errors most commonly seen in specific sections of the case reports.

Before you submit your revision, print this checklist, indicate by checking the line to the left of each item that you've reviewed it, and upload it with your revision using the "Optional Checklist" file selection.

GENERAL ITEMS

CLAR	ITY	
	Review the paper for grammatical errors.	
	Do not use jargon. JCEM Case Reports has a global readership and jargon does not translate well.	
CAPIT	ALIZATION	
	Capitalization should be reserved for the first word of a sentence, abbreviations, and proper names.	
	Do not capitalize the generic names of medications.	
GREE	K CHARACTERS	
	Always use Greek characters where appropriate and do not use substitutes. Example: use μ instead of use	
ABBRI	EVIATIONS	
	Expand all abbreviations on first usage in BOTH the abstract and main text.	
	Once an abbreviation is introduced, use it consistently in all subsequent mentions.	
GENE	NAMES	
	Names of genes must be italicized. The protein related to that gene should not be italicized.	
	"Pathogenic variant" is preferred to "mutation" in most instances	
DATA PRESENTATION		
	Provide all laboratory values in both conventional and SI units.	
	Include units of measurement for all numeric values.	
	When first introducing a laboratory variable in both the abstract and main text, provide the normal reference range.	
DISEA	ASE NAMES, DRUG NAMES, AND PATIENT CONSIDERATIONS Per AMA Manual of Style, possessive eponyms should be avoided (ie, "Cushing's syndrome" should be "Cushing syndrome", "Paget's disease" should be "Paget disease")	
	Avoid labeling patients and patient groups. Instead of writing "diabetic patients", use "patients with diabetes".	

	Do not use drug trade names in manuscript titles. Use generic names and if needed the trade name can follow in parentheses in the text.	
	SPECIFIC SECTIONS	
TITLE	PAGE Confirm spelling of all author names.	
	Confirm that each author is accurately represented, with initials, in the Contributors section.	
MAIN ——	BODY OF CASE REPORT Use only those headers as indicated in the template found at https://academic.oup.com/jcemcr/pages/author-guidelines#Templates	
	Avoid subheaders.	
ACKN	OWLEDGMENTS THIS SECTION IS OPTIONAL. List collaborators or mentors not listed as authors but who contributed to patient management and/or development of this case report.	
	Do not use this section to provide patient consent information.	
CONT	RIBUTORS All authors listed on the title page must be referred to by initials in this section. Initials must correspond to the name as presented on the title page.	
FUNDING		
	List any sources of funding pertinent to the manuscript.	
	If there was no funding, insert the following phrase: No public or commercial funding.	
DISCLOSURES		
	List actual or perceived conflicts of interest for all authors.	
	If there are no disclosures to make, insert the following phrase: None declared.	
INFOF	RMED PATIENT CONSENT FOR PUBLICATION If multiple cases are discussed, this statement should be plural.	
	If the case involves a pediatric patient, the statement must reflect that consent is provided by someone other than the patient.	
DATA	AVAILABILITY STATEMENT Select the appropriate statement as shown in the Author Guidelines.	
REFER	List references in consecutive numerical order (in parentheses) in the text, figures, and tables and list in the same numerical order at the end of the manuscript. References in tables and figures should be cited in sequence with those in the text. The numbering should shift to the table or figure after the table or figure is first mentioned in the text.	

	Confirm that the references use the formats described in the Author Guidelines.
FIGURI	ES Graphs must have the X and Y axes clearly labeled.
	Lettering must be clear.
	Fonts should be embedded in the file.
	Resolution must be high. Recommended resolutions are: Line art (monochrome): 600–1200 DPI Halftone (grayscale only): 300 DPI Combination (halftone with type or lines) or color: 600 DPI
TABLES	All columns must have headers.
	Use Greek characters. For example, use $\boldsymbol{\mu}$ instead of $\boldsymbol{u}.$
	If the table contains references to specific articles, the full citation to that article must be in the Reference list.
	Decimal points must be presented consistently.
	If abbreviations are used, expand them in a footnote and then list them alphabetically.
	Include ND for No Data and NA for Not Available.
